Answer to Scenario 3 – Mark Room 2

Boat S is penalized under <u>Rule 11</u>, On the Same Tack, Overlapped. As P approaches S on the opposite tack, P is required to keep clear under <u>rule 10</u>, On Opposite Tacks. Once P is on a close-hauled course, she becomes the right-of-way boat (as the leeward boat), and is required by <u>rule 15</u>, Acquiring Right of Way, to initially give S room to keep clear of her. Throughout the maneuver, S never needs to take avoiding action; there P keeps clear and then complies with rule 15 as required.

When P passes head to wind in the zone at the mark, <u>rule 18.3</u>, Tacking in the Zone, requires that she not cause SW to sail above close-hauled to avoid contact. S did not sail above close-hauled; therefore, P did not break rule 18.3. Once P is on a close-hauled course and overlapped to leeward of S, S (as the windward boat) becomes required to keep clear of her under rule 11. By bearing away towards P and causing P to take action to avoid her, S breaks rule 11.

P chooses to take a penalty for touching the mark. This, however, does not remove her right to also protest S (see rule 60.1(a), Right to Protest: Right to Request Redress or Rule 69 Action). Based on the facts, S breaks rule 11 and is penalized. The fact the P took a one-turn penalty cannot be undone. However, had P not taken a penalty, she would be exonerated by the protest committee for breaking <u>rule 31</u>, Touching a Mark, under rule 64.1(a), decisions, Penalties and Exoneration.
