Answer to Scenario 3 – Redress #2

Boat P is disqualified from the race that she was intending to sail in for breaking <u>rule 14</u>, <u>Avoiding Contact</u>; and Boat S is granted redress under <u>rule 64.2</u>, <u>Decisions on Redress</u>. The preamble to Part 2 states in part, "The rules of Part 2 apply between boats that are sailing in or near the racing area and intend to race...". Therefore, Part 2 of The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS) apply to S and P. P is required to keep clear under <u>rule 10</u>, <u>On Opposite Tacks</u>, and both boats are required to avoid contact if reasonably possible under rule 14 (both of which are in Part 2 of the RRS). S is entitled to redress because S's score or place in the race is made significantly worse through no fault of her own by being physically damaged by P who was breaking a rule of Part 2 (see <u>rule 62.1(6)</u>, <u>Redress</u>).

The preamble to Part 2 also states that a boat not racing shall not be penalized for breaking a rule of Part 2, except rule 14 when the incident results in injury or serious damage, or rule 24.1, Interfering with Another Boat, which does not apply in this case. S is not able to avoid the collision so she does not break rule 14. However, P breaks rule 14 and the damage is "serious." Rule 64.1, Decisions: Penalties and Exoneration states, "If a boat has broken a rule when not racing, her penalty shall apply to the race sailed nearest in time to that of the incident."
